Eager Reception: They received the Word with a ready mind Diligent Examination: They search the Scriptures daily Personal Conclusion: They came to their own conclusions based upon their own Biblical research

Suggestions

Establish Your Own Berean Fellowship

Reach out to your friends, family, neighbors and acquaintances and invite them to attend your group. A weekly meeting place and time is suggested. Select a passage to focus upon or a question that has been asked and then associate the question with a good primary passage of scripture.

Read the Passage Daily, Individually

Download and print the **Berean Fellowship Study Journal** from the website **OR** acquire a notepad (spiral bound is best) and note the passage you have chosen. Read the passage once and then look through the list of questions above. You will NEVER be able to find ALL of the ten questions above, but you will usually be able to find something. Note your discoveries and discuss them with your group.
